# Support Coordinator / Behaviour Support Checklist

### What is a Behaviour Support Plan?

A Behaviour Support Plan (BSP) is a document that has evidence-informed strategies to improve a person's quality of life and reduce behaviours of concern. A BSP works to address the needs of the person identified as having complex behaviours of concern that may currently require restrictive practices to keep the person and others safe.

A Behaviour Support Plan is developed and implemented in consultation with the person with disability, their family, carers, health care professionals, school for young people and other support people.

### 1. Is there funding in the Capacity Building Relationships budget?

## 2. Is the CB Relationships provider of choice registered to develop NDIS Behaviour Support Plans?

Providers who develop Behaviour Support plans (specialist behaviour support providers) must be registered for the Behaviour Support category with the NDIS Quality and Safeguard Commission. This is the same requirement for all participants and providers, regardless how the budget is managed.

### 3. Is or will a provider be implementing a regulated restrictive practice/s?

Any provider who implements restrictive practices must be registered with the NDIS Quality and Safeguard Commission and comply with all reporting requirements.
